Dr. Anne Romeo has big plans for pet care in the King William and Southtown areas of San Antonio. She is partnering with City Vet to renovate a space on S. Alamo that will offer comprehensive care to pets. She received her bachelor's degree from Texas State University and her master's degree in Cell and Structural Biology from the UT Health Science Center. She has always loved pets and yearned to care for them, which led her to vet school at Texas A&M in College Station. While she will be an owner of the City Vet clinic, by partnering with the organization they help handle the unique marketing and financial support needed to ensure the success of her practice.

Dr. Romeo has one dog, an American Bully. She was dropped off at a clinic where she worked in Austin. Hippo, her dog, is a high maintenance diva according to Anne. A beta fish rounds out her family of three.

The City Vet clinic will be a general veterinary medical practice which will offer preventive care, spay/neuter services, dental health, sick/internal medicine services, as well as having surgery centers for both dogs and cats. Her practice will also be feline friendly offering a separate waiting area, exam rooms, and treatment/hospital area for your feline friends. Her hope is that pet owners will feel welcomed and ultimately become "family" as she hopes to create a clinic that can watch and care for pets throughout their lifetimes. The clinic's goal is to offer

a gold standard of care that is based on the spectrum of care needed for each pet. In addition to offering top notch care for pets, she also hopes to support pet owners as they strive to provide love and care for their furry family members. Another personal and professional goal of Dr. Romeo's is to mentor others to achieve their success. She wants to be available to the community and schools to educate others about pet needs and care.

One of the current challenges of pet care is that most inner cities are underserved, and owners must travel to other areas of the city to re-



ceive care for their pets. The current extreme heat has also been a challenge for pets and their owners. While most pets thrive on outdoor exercise and daily walks, triple digit temperatures are dangerous. She recommends all walks occur in the morning when heat advisories are in effect. Ensuring pets drink plenty of liquids throughout the day. Adding ice cubes and frozen berries to liquids is also helpful. Wearing shoes or booties when walking on asphalt or concrete is recommended as heat tends to stay constant on those areas in times of extreme heat. Imagine a human walking on those areas without shoes.

Dr. Romeo stresses that before making a pet a part of your family, make sure you can provide a lifetime of love and care. Pet insurance is highly recommended because animal expenses can add up. Potential pet owners should budget for vaccines, food, and general care. Spaying/neutering your pet is a responsibility pet owners should always consider. Research the needs and personality characteristics of dogs and cats before adopting or purchasing. Some dog breeds ands sizes require much socialization and exercise. Training may often be in order.

OUT IN THE GARDEN WITH ALAN CASH


With excessive summer temperatures, water use billings get larger each month. According to The Environmental Protection Agency, Americans pour NINE BILLION gallons of water on landscaping every day. For the homeowner one way to cut water use charges is to reduce the amount of lawn grass in our gardens. Do that by replacing turf with four to five inches of mulch. There are now several colors to choose from which will add to the garden's appeal. Then intersperse various drought tolerant plants throughout the area.





Garden Tips

- * Perennials are plants that last more than two years. Some are evergreen and others freeze in winter but return in spring. Popular perennials are: salvias, Turks cap, lantana, Mexican oregano, plumbago, shrimp and firebush. Plant them in the fall as cooler weather arrives
- * Add mulch to flower beds to maintain a depth of three to five inches to keep moisture in the soil.
- * After cutting herbs hang them upside down to dry. This allows the flow of oil from the stem into the leaves that gives herbs their flavor
- * With their colorful leaves, coleus add color to the garden. Most begin to put on flowers as they reach maturity. Pinch them off as they appear to extend the life of the plant.

The Secret Life of KWA Board President Shawn Campbell

What profession do you pursue when you rode horses, swam competitively, and didn't want a 9-5 desk job? Become a what?!

Shawn Campbell was born in Houston, TX, but as the daughter of a Rice graduate mechanical engineer working for Brown & Root Oil, she spent her preteens in Tripoli, Libya; Cairo, Egypt; and Athens, Greece. College vacations were spent in London and Mexico City. She graduated Magna Cum Laude in Political Science (could have been Summa but her now husband Jim Campbell distracted her) at the University of Texas A&M in the 1976 Centennial Class.

She was hired as a Special Agent by the United States Secret Service that summer and began her 21-year career in the Houston Field Office. From there, her career track was Presidential Protective Division, Candidate Nominee Protective Division, Office of Training, Intelligence Division, Dallas Field Office as one of the first female supervisory ATSAICs (Assistant to the Special Agent in Charge) for fraud investigations and ended her career as the Resident Agent in Charge (RAIC) of the Austin Field Office (the first female agent to run a field office.) But, once retired in April 1997, Shawn found that raising two boys was much more difficult. Where was the government instruction manual?!

San Antonio Artist Doerte Weber is a conceptual artist who works mostly in fibers. The King William Association is hosting a Premier Exhibit of new works by the artist. She describes herself as mostly a self-taught artist who weaves with diverse modern, quotidian materials. In this process, she searches to push the boundaries of the materials she is using which enables her to tell a story. As a German/ American living in San Antonio since 1986, King William has always been a favorite neighborhood.

The theme Doerte is exploring with this exhibit is the interwoven history of Germans in Texas, how the King William neighborhood came to be, how it has grown and what vestiges of that history remain. Her research led her down many interesting paths, including a historical



tie back to her own home region. She explored the arduous journey in leaving Germany and the people's disappointments as well as successes. These works are somewhat different from her usual art. Doerte states "I hope you enjoy viewing these as much as I enjoyed researching and creating them."
