Letter from the Executive Director

Last year's Fair was a bit rough, to put it mildly. As the day progressed, the failure of BlastPass became more apparent, and the cleanup from that fiasco took months. A big chunk of my summer was spent dealing with the aftermath which included staff changes and hundreds of refunds to Fairgoers. I am grateful for the 2023 Executive Committee, who, along with me, crafted a plan to address what became a PR nightmare. Three days after the debacle, KWA announced the return of paper tickets and an old-fashioned Fair for 2024. The goodwill that swift decision making generated was exactly what we needed, and over the next several months I personally refunded thousands of dollars to Fairgoers who, upon receipt of their funds, replied with appreciation and a commitment to return to the King William Fair in 2024. It was a challenge for the staff that remained, but we are stronger for it now.

With the addition of two new staff, my goal for the 2024 Fair was to make the planning of the event a group effort. Every staff member at KWA has been involved in the planning of this year's Fair. Our own Parade Wrangler, Alicia Spence-Schlesinger, designed a beautiful medal in memory of Jessie Simpson. It's a return to a medal that features an historic home in King William, and it also fits KWA's desire to make the Fair more sustainable. This year's medal was made in the USA, instead of China, and is made of sustainable wood. We have transitioned to compostable cups for beverages purchased at the Fair. Our Fair T-shirts are made from recycled bottles. We're introducing water bottle filling stations to cut back on single-use plastics. We're even adding PSA messages about confetti throughout the parade to diminish the use of plastic confetti which ends up in our yards and river.

But the most important change of all is our return to the type of Fair that everyone knew and loved. We've lowered the price of admission, lowered the cost of activities for families in Kid's Kingdom, and we've brought back paper carnival tickets that can be used for food, beverages, Kid's Kingdom and in the Texas Wine Garden.

This year's parade theme is Love in Bloom. With the Fair we have strived to demonstrate love this year in all these ways – with our sustainability initiatives, with lower prices that prioritize affordability for all Fairgoers, and by embracing simplicity and going back to the basics of what made the Fair great. My hope is that all Fairgoers will feel the love this year.

Viva Fiesta!

Fair Director's Message

For more than fifty years, the King William Fair has provided a wonderful opportunity to celebrate and enjoy San Antonio's rich culture and beauty. As an organization dedicated to promoting the health and welfare of the neighborhood, we're starting to think longer term, and on a larger scale, about how we can continue to celebrate while also having a positive impact on our planet. For a while now, the Fair has had recycling available and has prohibited giving out paper collateral, but this year we'll begin to take even bigger steps to reduce waste, conserve resources, and minimize our carbon emissions. You play an important role in making this happen, too!

Here are some of the things that we're doing to make a difference and the ways that you can help, too.

- · We'll have 4 water refill stations throughout the Fair Zone one by the Guenther & King William entrance, two by Kid's Kingdom, and one by the King William Association office at Turner & Madison. Bring your refillable water bottle (no larger than 32 ounces) and fill up throughout the day to reduce the number of plastic bottles going into circulation.
- · This year, our beverage cups will be made of compostable material.
- · Knowing that plastic and metal confetti can be devastating to the environment, especially our beautiful San Antonio River, they are prohibited in the Parade and Fair Zones. We'll be celebrating with eco-friendly bubbles as an alternative. We encourage you to do the same.
- · Our unique Fiesta medal is made in the United States of a sustainable, light-weight wood this year! This "woodallion" has a smaller carbon footprint and reminds one of the preservation efforts in our historic neighborhood.
- · Our Fair t-shirts will be made with 50% recycled plastic bottles. You can wear your t-shirt with pride knowing that it kept several plastic bottles out of the landfill where it can take 400-1000 years to decompose.
- · Some of the art projects in Kid's Kingdom will be made with recycled products.
- · We'll have our Bike Valet station at 1008 S Alamo, the AVA-America's Walking Club. Ride your bike to the Fair and, on a donation basis, have it watched over by the women of the local branch of Black Girls Do Ride, a national bicycling non-profit.
- · If biking isn't your thing, consider carpooling, ridesharing, or VIA to get to the Fair. Save yourself the hassle of finding parking and reduce your own carbon footprint.

These are just some of the examples of ways to prioritize the health of our neighborhood and planet while still having a fun-filled, family-friendly, Fiesta-worthy blast at the King William Fair!

Lots of Entertainment Options!

Part of what makes King William Fair so special is that each of the five different entertainment areas has its own distinct look, sound and feel.

King William Park Stage, perched alongside the gazebo in King William Park, is focused on jazz in six exciting flavors, ranging from percussive Latin Jazz to the rollicking rhythms of New Orleans-style jazz; from free-wheeling vocal stylings to instrumental American jazz standards and contemporary jazz. This lively and lovely park setting is a perfect spot to set up your lawn chair, kick back and soak up the vibes!

For those who prefer to rock out, **Pat's Pub Stage** delivers various flavors of Fiesta Party Music, served up by a Who's Who of South

Texas musicians "doing their thang" San Anto-style in a street dance setting located behind the Johnson Street Bridge.

One block north and a whole world away, **Julia's Veranda** is tucked into a quiet, shady sec-

tion of Sheridan Street, between the River Walk and the Texas Wine Garden. Here you'll find a gentle, but upbeat variety of acoustic music, ranging from classical guitar music to folkrock-rhumba, experimental indie folk, Mexican folk tunes, and Americana ballads. Sit back and drift back through time as you let yourself fall under a musical spell for a while.

Meanwhile, **Artist's Alley Stage** is in the 500 block of Madison, where a bright blend of art and craft booths offers the perfect background for a lively variety of singer/songwriters from Flamenco to Texana, Gypsy Jazz, Americana, and soft rock. With plenty of seating under a large canopy, it's the perfect spot to see and be seen.

And then there's **Kid's Kingdom Stage**, located in Upper Mill Park, the perfect shady setting for a wide variety of interactive children's activities, and a big stage full of family fun. Children of all ages will be entranced by the blend of

vaudevillian magic, wacky kid's songs, and a dazzling variety of dancers: traditional American cloggers, Hawaiian hula, Brazilian capoeira, Mexican folklorico, and contemporary dance, too. And this year, Kid's Kingdom will also be the setting for our annual Best Bite Competition at 11:30 a.m., when various food vendors will compete for the honor of being named the Best Bite Sweet and Savory winners.

In short, wherever you find yourself on Fair Day, you're sure to be entertained in style!

Would you like to take a trip around the world and experience global style without leaving your neighborhood? This year the King William Fair offers fairgoers an expanded World Market on the 200 block of Johnson Street where you will find a wide variety of unique artisanal goods, handmade crafts, food favorites, wearables, and design inspirations for your home.

Imagine a colorful hand woven huipil from Mexico paired with a vintage necklace from Afghanistan. Check out a handmade linen Guayabera shirt with its bright tropical birds stitched into the pleats. Fill your kitchen with Mexican Moles, Hot Chocolate and hand painted clay mugs. Wrap up in 100% cotton Futa Turkish towel or a colorful woven linen blanket. Take home a handblown blue glass evil eye made by Turkish artisans, a tradition that goes back thousands of years.

Experience the richness of Colombian culture by wearing a Mochila, a crocheted bag made by female indigenous artisans. Feel the deep connection to the Kuna Tribe living on the coasts of Colombia and Panama as you wear a hand-sewn leather handbag with colorful reverse applique "mola" designs.







The 2024 King William Fair is thrilled to announce the return of the much celebrated paper tickets used to purchase food/beverages/Kid's Kingdom activities! After the frustrations of the cashless device wristbands used during the 2023 Fair, the King William Association Board made the decision to return to paper tickets for the 2024 Fair, a welcoming move creating happiness to our loyal fairgoers and vendors!

Tickets

Advance Tickets for food/beverages/ Kid's Kingdom activities are available for purchase online in packs of 20 at https://www.kwfair.org/p/admission. You will receive a QR code to redeem at any of the nine ticket booths on Fair Day in exchange for your paper tickets. 1 ticket = \$1. Paper tickets can also be purchased at the KWA office in any amount or on the Day of the Fair at a ticket booth.

Admission

Advance General Admission is \$15 for ages 12 and up, and children 11 and under enter FREE. Buy early, the General Admission price will increase to \$20 on Fair Day. Advance General Admission can be purchased at the KWA office or online at https://www.kwfair.org/p/admission. If you buy online, you must bring your online purchase confirmation (QR code) to the event to redeem for an Admission wristband. Fairgoers must have an Admission wristband to purchase paper tickets from a booth on Fair Day. No exchanges or refunds, and the event is rain or shine. Day of the Fair General Admission can also be purchased at an Admission Gate for \$20.

I have quite the line up for you from amazing coffee and Crepes to your traditional Chicken on a Stick. You will definitely want to buy your KWF Food and Beverage tickets to try all the delicious food. You can buy your tickets in advance at our office (122 Madison 78204) or on our website (www.kwfair. org).

I have some exciting news to share! This year our annual Best Bite Competition will be held the day of the Fair at the Kid's Kingdom stage starting at 11:30am. Our Food Vendors will be bringing their new \$5 creations before 5 awesome Fiesta Food savvy judges. After the Parade, make your way over to Kids Kingdom (in the park across from 232 Washington St.) to see our Best Bite Competition and then head over to the participating vendor's booths to try the dishes. Also, we have heard your requests and have added more sitting areas around the Fair. This year you can grab some food and find a place to sit at King William Park, on the 500 block of Madison, in the Texas Wine Garden (100 block of Sheridan), in Pat's Pub (100 block of Johnson), and

on the 500 block of King William.

Now that I have gotten the business part of this article out of the way, this year I wanted to take some time to introduce you to a new Food Vendor. His name is William with Gourmand Food Services. William has been in the food industry for 26 years. He started when he was 14 years old and had his first job as a dishwasher and now is currently having fun making creative food dishes for Fairs and Festivals. Recycling & Sustainability

Thanks to the City of San Antonio Solid Waste Management Department, we will be able to continue our efforts to recycle at the Fair. Throughout the Fair Zone will be blue ClearStream wire frames holding black plastic bags for you to recycle empty bottles and cups on Fair Day.

Let's all join together and keep our neighborhood clean while reducing waste and protecting our environment!

Friday, April 26

On the Friday before Fair Day, vendors and volunteers will place water barriers, dumpster roll offs, portable toilets, and temporary electric meters. **Please do not handle or remove any of these items as they are for use on Fair Day.** Also, please do not use the dumpster roll offs for your household trash. We ask that you remove your domestic trash and recycling bins from the curbs before or as soon as possible on Friday, April 26 to clear the way for Fair set up.

Saturday, April 27

Fair Day! Brackenridge High School students will assist our environmental team all day by collecting and sorting garbage from the recycling. They will not empty your household bins, so please treat your party trash/recycling as any other day by placing it in your bins and moving them to the street on your regularly scheduled collection day. When the Fair ends at 6 p.m., the students will turn over our trash barrels. Please do not set trash on top of the barrels.

Street-sweeping machines will make their way through the Fair Zone on Sunday morning. Please do not park on the Fair Zone streets until noon on Sunday. Fair Zone residents may park at H-E-B Head-quarters beginning at 5 p.m. Friday noon through Sunday noon. By keeping your vehicles off the streets Saturday night, you also allow us to remove some of the electrical lines on Sunday morning. If your vehicle is parked on an electrical line, we may have to tow your vehicle.

Sunday, April 28

Contractors and volunteers will walk throughout the streets picking up any remaining debris. We would greatly appreciate your help in this if you are able to take a trash bag out Sunday morning and pick up any debris in your neighborhood area.
