The Molly Shafer Gallery Dedicated

We are delighted to welcome you to the newly dedicated Molly Shafer Gallery and to the opening of its premier exhibit featuring the work of Regina Moya, our virtual artist in residence.

Molly Shafer is a name that is synonymous with art in San Antonio and, in particular, with art in King William (KW), so it is very fitting that the King William Association Board should move to recognize Molly by naming this gallery in her honor. However, it is difficult to think of Molly and her many contributions to the neighborhood without thinking of Harry Shafer, Molly's husband, former president of King William Association (KWA).

Molly and Harry met in 1983 and they married in 1988. Molly joined Harry in College Station. the first archaeologist to join the faculty of Texas A&M University's College of Liberal Arts. Molly was a psychologist and became director of Special Services for College Station Independent School District. These two art lovers eventually gravitated to San Antonio in 2002 and directed the creation of their magnificent King William abode in the lofts on Madison.

New to King William, they were amazed and aghast to find themselves confronting widespread graffiti in the neighborhood. They acted immediately to see what could be done. Molly and Harry, organized a group of neighborhood volunteers to address the graffiti and worked with the city graffiti abatement team for training and tools to do the job. This led to collaboration with local artists, neighbors and the city probation department to provide wipes, paint, and elbow grease to remove the blight. The graffiti abatement program subsequently inspired the delightful mural we see on the Insco Building at the corner of South Alamo and Guenther.

The Insco building's west wall had long been a graffiti magnet. Molly researched graffiti deterrence in large cities and found that public art—murals—work well because graffiti artists do not want to disrespect other artists' work. (Story continued on pg.3)

Molly obtained funding from the city, KWA and private donors and patiently worked through 5 layers of city bureaucracy to gain the approval for the mural. In 2008, artist Jane Madrigal, with the assistance of artist Jose Cosme, completed the mural that pays tribute to the history of the people and the San Antonio River.

Molly and Harry were also dismayed as First Friday, which began as a legitimate art walk, morphed into a carnival atmosphere of food booths, loud music. excessive drinking, and trash buildup. Their activist natures came into play once again. They explored solutions, solicited allies and were instrumental in corralling many of the unruly aspects of the event. Food booths were no longer allowed.

In 2008,Molly, the consummate art lover, recruited residents to form the KW Public Art Committee, later renamed the King William Cultural Arts Committee (CAC). Molly's vision was to bring public art and cultural events to the King William neighborhood, with a focus on artists in the neighborhood. Under her leadership, our neighborhood has benefitted in many ways: the installation of 5 art benches,

four walking maps of King William, at the KWA office, wayfinding signs, concerts in the park, art exhibits and a speaker series. Current CAC members are Nora Peterson, Susan Athene, Ethel Pedraza, and Sherry Hess. Robin Raquet and Margaret Leeds are Board liaisons to the committee. Jim Gillette created an artistic and informative website for the CAD.

It was Molly who had the foresight and was the guiding force that led the Texas Commission of the Arts to officially designate this area as the King William Cultural Arts District. This rare and distinct honor was presented on November 29, 2011 at SAY Si'.

For the past 18 years we have had the benefit of Molly's love of the arts, her creativity, her drive and enthusiasm, her bent for activism. You might say Molly is still Director of Special Services and King William is the grateful recipient of those services. We thank you, Molly.

Rehab Corner -Please No Rocks in the Front Yard

Landscape designs in the King William Historic District vary depending on their setting and period of construction. These historic landscapes provide clues to the past and aid in the overall interpretation of our historic district and our homes. While some areas feature sweeping historic lawns and formal elements, many homes feature a diverse palette of landscape features, such as more informal xeric plantings, which are often appropriate within the historic context. Overall, the goal should be to conserve water while preserving the historic context.

Having said that, you should not replacing planting, including grass, flowers, bushes, and trees, with rocks and rock mulch. Rocks and rock mulch should not be used exclusively but may be incorporated into the overall design. Rock and inorganic mulch is encouraged around the base of the home is recommended to allow water to dissipate. However, it can detract from the character of historic structures and create stark contrast in the historic street pattern when used exclusively in the front yard.

Similarly, parkways or planting strips

between the sidewalk and the curb should be maintained with trees, plants, grass, and mulch. Lawn should not be replaced with pavers, raised planting beds or rocks, which changes the character of the streetscape.

Homeward Bound is a global leadership program for women centered on developing women as leaders who can speak and drive action in regards to climate change and the crisis that the world will face. Dr Deb Mueller, trauma surgeon and past President of KWA, was chosen from a pool of global applicants to participate. In December 2019 she joined women from 33 countries on the largest all woman expedition to Antarctica, the most ecologically sensitive place on our planet. Learn why she was inspired to apply, enjoy a visual journey to The Last Continent, and learn why climate change there will affect us all.

KWA Grant Helps the Cannoli Fund

The Cannoli Fund received a grant from the KWA to help with our work with dogs and cats in the neighborhood. The majority of the grant will be used to fund Save Our Strays. This program helps neighbors rescue stray dogs and cats, the expense of which can sometimes be substantial. Even the cost routine evaluation and testing, plus standard preventive care and, of course, spay and neuter and microchipping, is a significant





eliminate this financial barrier to rescue and fostering or adoption of stray dogs and cats by King William residents.

We are happy to report that the program has been embraced by our neighborhood animal-lovers. For some animals, this has meant basic vetting. For others, more major care was needed. For a Chihuahua/ dachshund mix, we covered both heartworm treatment and dental cleaning and extractions, along with neutering and microchipping. For a German shepherd, it meant basic preventive care, treatment for worms, and spaying. For an Australian shepherd, care involved treatment for an autoimmune nose condition to which collie breeds are prone, as well as whipworms. For cats, care has included treatment for ringworm, intestinal parasites, skin lesions, and respiratory infections, in addition to vaccinations, spay/neuter, and microchipping.

Some of these animals have been adopted by their rescuers; others have found new homes in and out of the neighborhood. All are leading better lives off the streets, and are not contributing to our overpopulation problem by reproducing. The Cannoli Fund's mission is to improve the lives of animals, and thanks to this grant from the KWA, made possible by the hardworking Fair staff and volunteers, we are able to do so!

Good Will Dining

Ever closer to an empty nest - our youngest, now driving and working part time, gives us the freedom to explore more of the things we love most – great culinary experiences.

This was certainly true last month as we took advantage of Culinaria Week. So, there were many options to choose from. We decided to try someplace new, Rebelle located in the St. Anthony Hotel is another Goodman Bowers creatively transforming a hotel restaurant into an exciting vibrant dining space and cuisine. We met up with some friends for a predinner cocktail at Haunt - a modern take on a speakeasy – classic artisan happy hour cocktails, included martinis, oldfashioned, French 75's.

Rebelle's menu is undoubtably seafood forward with emphasis on shareable plates cold and hot. We started with some east coast oysters accompanied with a Turkish apricot cocktail sauce. Our pre-fixe Culinaria Week menus started with an Ocean Chowder with bacon, crème fraiche served

points; char-grilled Spanish octopus with corona beans, guanciale and basil pesto; crab cake, jumbo lump crab and caper dill sauce – so tasty. Our entrees included: Cioppino, white fish, shrimp, scallops, mussels, clams in an herbtomato broth; half lobster, crispy garlic, herb butter, lobster claw stuffing and Prime N.Y. Strip with cheddar baked tomato and bearnaise sauce. We enjoyed a delicious Tempranillo Rosé and a luscious Russian River Pinot Noir. We finished with a key lime mousse, white chocolate crumble and blueberry compote and peanut butter pie, whipped cream, malted peanuts and chocolate pretzels.

The night was relatively young, and as we had taken advantage of the FREE valet parking, we strolled over to Maverick Whiskey for a night cap, which is another story for another time. We had a thoroughly enjoyable evening with exciting atmosphere, warm attentive



- 1. If flowerpots become infested with fire ants, water with a solution of one teaspoon Orange Oil in a gallon of water.
- 2. According to the Old House Journal, we should plant petunias and nasturiums in vegetable gardens to repel aphids and other damaging insects.
- 3. Wait until early April to plant periwinkles and caladiums when the soil has warmed.
- **4.** If you have potted ferns and would like more, cut them back to about two or three inches high. Then remove the root ball from the pot and with a sharp knife, cut it in half. Pot each section in a separate pot and water thoroughly with an organic liquid fertilizer. A solution of half strength is good as a root stimulator.

ACS Survey On Pet Sales Open

You can find a lot of happiness at rescues and shelters all over San Antonio. And our survey says: Animal Care Services (ACS) wants feedback from you. Last summer, ACS conducted a survey to get feedback on several important topics. Over 3,200 respondents stated that unregulated pet sales in San Antonio contribute to our local animal overpopulation issues.

In response, Animal Care Services drafted proposals that included enhanced penalties for violators as well as additional pet sales restrictions. We would appreciate your opinion on them. The survey, available in both English and Spanish, can be accessed in a number of ways:

Microchips Mean Love: Last week a friend found a handsome English bulldog boy who had lost his way. We had him scanned for a microchip, and there were some issues with the registration, so we couldn't contact the owners. We notified Animal Control and 30 minutes later his frantic owners contacted them. You can get your pets microchipped for free any time ACS is open—don't delay!

2020 Fiesta Medals Have Arrived


